

Objectionable Provisions in H.R. 2217 Conference Report for Interior Appropriations

BILL LANGUAGE

- Additional \$1,775,000 for the assessment of mineral potential of public lands in Alaska
- Earmark of \$2,000,000 to be provided to local governments in southern California for planning associated with the Natural Communities Conservation Planning program
- Language stating that of the amount provided for Cuyahoga National Park, \$200,000 is for the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad platform and station in Canton, Ohio.
- Language stating that notwithstanding any other provision of law, the National Park Service may convey a leasehold or freehold interest in Cuyahoga NP to allow for the development of utilities and parking needed to support the historic Everett Church in the village of Everett, Ohio
- Earmark of \$4,500,000 to be made available to Kake Tribal Corporation as an advanced lump sum payment.
- Earmark of \$5,000,000 to be allocated to the Alaska Region, in addition to its normal allocation for the purposes of preparing additional timber for sale.
- Language stating that for necessary expenses of the Forest Service to manage federal lands in Alaska for subsistence uses under title VIII of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act.
- Language stating that funds appropriated to the Forest Service shall be available, as determined by the Secretary, for payments to Del Norte County, California.
- Language stating that the Secretary of Agriculture may authorize the sale of excess buildings, facilities, and other properties owned by the Forest Service and located on the Green Mountain National Forest, the revenues of which shall be retained by the Forest Service and available to the Secretary, without further appropriation and until expended for maintenance and rehabilitation activities on the Green Mountain National Forest.
- Earmark of \$11,000,000 is to begin a 7-year project for construction, renovation, furnishing, and demolition or removal of buildings at National Energy Technology Laboratory facilities in Morgantown, West Virginia and Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.
- Language stating that from the funds appropriated herein, \$5,000,000 shall be designated by the Indian Health Service as a contribution to the Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation to continue a priority project for the acquisition of land, planning, design and construction of 79 staff quarters in the Bethel service area, pursuant to the negotiated project agreement between the YKHC and the Indian Health Service.
- Language stating that notwithstanding any other provision of law, for fiscal year 2002 the Secretaries of Agriculture and the Interior are authorized to limit competition for watershed restoration project contracts as part of the "Jobs in the Woods" program established in Region 10 of the Forest Service to individuals and entities in historically timber-dependent areas in the States of Washington, Oregon, northern California and Alaska that have been affected by reduced timber harvesting on federal lands.

-Language that continues a program by which Alaska's surplus western red cedar is made available preferentially to U. S. domestic mills outside Alaska, prior to export abroad.

-Language which gives preference to dislocated workers for certain restoration contracts in the Giant Sequoia National Monument and the Sequoia National Forest.
