Dear Commissioner Manfred:

I write to you today to ask that, like the National Football League (NFL), you commence a full review of all contracts between Major League Baseball (MLB) teams and the Department of Defense (DOD) to determine if taxpayer funds were used to pay for patriotic displays or other activities honoring the troops at MLB games.

In our joint oversight report *Tackling Paid Patriotism*, Senator Flake and I detailed 18 contracts executed between MLB teams and the DOD between 2012 and 2015 that may have contained some form of paid patriotism.^{1,2} For example, an FY 2014 contract shows that the Wisconsin Army National Guard paid the Milwaukee Brewers \$49,000 to sponsor performances of "God Bless America," \$10,000 to recognize soldiers and their families, and \$7,500 for an on-field award presentation and the opportunity to throw out the first pitch at three Brewers home games. Such examples are a clear misuse of taxpayer dollars.

While I recognize the right of MLB and its teams to be paid for legitimate marketing and advertising activities, it seems unreasonable to expect American taxpayers to foot the bill in cases where a team or the league wishes to engage in activities that give the appearance of honoring our service members or highlighting the relationship between the MLB, its teams, and the military. Any organization with a genuine interest in honoring the troops, and deriving public credit as a result, should do so at its own expense and not at that of the American taxpayer. I urge you to take steps necessary to ensure that these paid patriotism activities do not continue.

¹ The report defined paid patriotism as color guard ceremonies, flag details, enlistment and reenlistment ceremonies, recognition of troops and/or veterans, game tickets, sponsorship of military appreciation and military night games.

² The 21 contracts may not be comprehensive of all contracts executed during the time period.

Like the NFL, you should consider returning this money or making a donation to the charitable organization of your choice that benefits our service members and veterans in an amount equal or greater to that paid to the teams by the DOD since 2012 for any activity intended to honor service members. I know that the MLB and its teams undertake numerous charitable activities already, but I believe that would be a fitting gesture, given the highly questionable nature of some of the activities that have occurred.

I thank you for your attention to this matter, and look forward to your response.
